


Key Stage One Music Knowledge organiser – Hands, Feet, Heart

What will I know and do by the end of the unit?

- Play accurately and **in time** as part of the performance.
- Understand that the rhythm is different to the pulse. Pulse is a steady beat like a ticking clock or your heartbeat. A rhythm is a pattern of sounds of different lengths.
- Perform by singing the song in unison, adding actions and movement.
- Know and use up to three notes from G, A, C, D and E.
