Parental Partnership

As you know from our shared plans for development, we are constantly reflecting on how to further improve our curriculum and support all children in achieving the end points they are expected to reach in each unit of work, term, year or key stage. We are fortunate to have such supportive parents and carers who are keen to discover more about how we teach; and how they can support this at home.

Parents who attend our workshops and open events say how useful they find them in understanding not only what their child is doing in school, but how they are doing it.



The teachers and I would like to invite you to an open session event on Wednesday 1st May straight after school. This is an event for parents and children to attend together. There will be an introduction and welcome in the hall from pick up time until 3.45pm. At this point, you will be invited to move to a class of your choice to take part in a session led by the class teacher. All sessions for all age groups will have a focus on securing recall of multiplication facts. Hopefully it will be useful to see that this starts in Jackson Class with knowledge of number and pattern and then through to the end of Year 4 when recall of all multiplication facts should be secure. Clear steps and understanding of what needs to be achieved by the end of each school year in order to move on will be demonstrated to understand that every year is important as skills are built on year on year.

After the first 20 minute session, you will be invited by the teacher you are with, to move on to another classroom. This could be for another child in your family or to see a future class and what is coming next for them.

At the end of your second session at about 4.30pm you will be able to come back to the hall to ask any more questions and share what you found useful.

We do hope that these sessions will be well attended and most importantly useful to you in feeling you are able to support your child(ren) in such an important part of the maths curriculum and certainly a skill for life.

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School Development through Pupil Partnership

Our journey as a school to achieve constant improvement, is of course driven by the needs of the children. With the new library, the children's love of reading is excelling! A few years ago, the children were not particularly enthused by books and very few were able to share a favourite book or author when asked.

Texts are now carefully selected and displayed to encourage a love of reading. This can be seen across the school in classrooms, assemblies, themed weeks and of course the library itself.

We had a very useful talking group session this month which further evidenced the progress we have made in encouraging the children to develop a life-long love of reading.

Our school councillors asked their groups if they have a favourite author or book and what they enjoy doing in the library. Every child was able to name a favourite book or author, the children also made it clear that our after school book clubs and class texts have also inspired reading. Our visiting author Steve Clifford was also mentioned!

The children reported that they enjoyed visiting our library and described their sessions beautifully. As ever, we also asked how to make them even better. The brilliant responses (below) will be put into action by the teachers as soon as possible!

- Have time to act books out.
 - Spend more time in the library.
- Have some activities to do in the library about the books our teachers read to us.
- Have a spoon area where you can act out stories.
- Have a book making area.

And finally...

Thank you to the children who demonstrate every time I speak to them how much they are learning and crucially remembering. I find time as often as my week allows, to meet with some of the children to ask them about their learning.

My latest conversations have been about science. Children in Year 1 and 2 were able to talk confidently about seasons, materials and plants and described how much they loved science because they got to explore real things. Their knowledge is so secure because they enjoy the learning experience so much.

Do feel free to come into your child's classroom after school (by arranging a day with their teacher) and listen to what they can tell you about their learning across the curriculum. They will blow you away!
