
The Owl – October 2020

Let's focus on resilience...

Our Junior Class and Infant class took part in the national Big Anti Bullying Assembly where they met virtually with children who have experienced difficult times but who have had the courage to speak out and ask for help. All of our children including Early Years now have a 'trusted 5'. These are people who they would speak to if they had a worry or concern. Knowing that there is someone there for you certainly helps you to show **resilience** when needed.





Do you have a growth mind set? How do you know? Have you ever said, "I'm not good at maths", or "I can't draw!"? If you have ever said or thought similar things, then you are showing a fixed mind set. We are supporting the children (and staff too) to work on a growth mind set. Using assessment for learning, we are aiming to nurture our school towards becoming full of powerful, resilient and independent learners. The children are working hard to help themselves and their learning partners to understand that advice is not criticism and mistakes are not wrong. Both are avenues for growth on the learning journey. Staff are also being asked to think of areas of their own practice to grow; recognising, having a focus of development as an exciting thing to explore not to shy away from. We have some new friends to help us to grow our minds.

We truly are aiming to learn together and learn for life.
