


Key words

Remembrance Day poppy








Sticky Knowledge:

- Conditions in WWI were terrible, for example they had to stay in trenches.
- Men from Bysouth and Layton families in Reed died fighting in the war.
- We remember everyone who died in WWI and other wars on Remembrance Day.
- Soldiers who lost their lives are featured on memorials and our local memorial is in the church.
- We wear poppies to remember those who lost their lives. It is a poppy because it was the only plant that grew on the battlefields after the war.
