What does behaviour mean to you?




During a recent staff meeting, the following questions were considered during our discussions:

How are positive relationships nurtured within your school? Who is responsible for creating an inclusive environment for all pupils?

To us, the understanding of, and drive for inclusivity, is crucial to ensure all children are able to engage in full and wide curriculum experiences. One of the key themes in our answers to these questions was the level of importance we place on gathering the opinions of the children. This includes one to one sessions to understand how things are for individual pupils and bigger groups; in use of our Talking Groups lead by our School Council. The children at School Council, had expressed an interest in finding out why some behaviours change depending on who is the leading adult in a lesson or club. At our last Talking Group, that is exactly what our children in Bysouth and Layton Class were asked. Most children noticed that there were differences and our value of respect came up a lot.


The children were keen to share what positive behaviour for learning looks like and were also keen to be involved in monitoring their own behaviours. This request has since been met by asking the children during and after lessons without their main class teacher; whether the positive behaviours for learning were still seen and heard. Giving everyone a voice not only shows the value of all, but also accountability for all.

In our recent parent survey, 100% of our responders agreed or strongly agreed that the school makes sure children are well behaved and that their children feel safe. Visitors to the school always comment on the calm and supportive environment. All of this positive feedback I strongly believe, comes from the high level of involvement our children have in shaping our school and the part they play in ensuring our high



expectations are maintained. The children are confident to share when things could be better and I hope they always will be!
