	<p><b>Period</b> a particular length of time with a beginning and an end</p>		differences – What is different? What has <b>changed</b> ?
			<p><b>material</b> – what an object is made from This can often help to know when something might have been made.</p>
			<p><b>worn</b> – well used Be careful! Does worn always mean something is old?</p>
			<p><b>present</b> – now, today</p>
<p><b>past</b> – yesterday, a long time ago</p>			
		<p><b>design</b> – materials used together to make something for a particular reason</p>	
		<p>A <b>timeline</b> shows information in <b>chronological order</b>. The oldest toys are on the left-hand side because they were invented first. The <b>newest</b> toys are on the right-hand side because they show the most recent toys.</p>
