Raider	A person who enters a place in order to steal or take something.
Conqueror	A person who defeats another to take control.

Scandinavia	The area made up of the countries Norway, Sweden and Denmark
Runes	An ancient writing system.
Lindisfarne (or Holy Island)	An island off the north-east coast of England. The Vikings raided the monastery on Lindisfarne in 793AD.

- Vikings were pagan and often raided monasteries, stealing gold. We know now that monks exaggerated those accounts.

- Longships were designed so they could get to shallow water and go away quickly without being seen.
